Backstage With The Players

For fifty-eight years the Mountaineer Players have been presenting plays in the beauty of this unique outdoor amphitheatre, a record few amateur drama groups in this area can match. Only the Second World War has caused the cancellation of the Players' annual spring production at the club's Forest Theatre and Rhododendron Preserve.

The long and distinguished history of the Players and the Forest Theatre is a tribute to the talent, dedication and plain hard work of Mountaineers by the hundreds. Each year, as the play is presented, election of the new committee (Chairman, Vice Chairman, Secretary, Treasurer and committee representatives) is taking place behind the scenes. This committee is charged with the duty of continuing the tradition set down; their task is a massive one. Come early September, they start selecting a play, obtaining performance rights, choosing a director, casting the parts, conducting rehearsals, planning and creating sets, costumes and properties, designing the publicity, arranging for ushers, parking attendants and cast cooks. . .the list is endless.

As the Players get closer to the opening of the play, there are special problems that they face due to the nature of the theatre. If the script calls for a horse, mule, pigs, etc., they must be found and their entrances and exits set. The Players always look for plays that will allow for special effects, for when the script calls for an explosion, a burning barn, gushing oil wells, helium balloons or homing pigeons, our special effects people produce them.

Sets can also present a special problem, for if the weather has not been warm and sunny prior to the opening of the play, all actors are instructed as they go on stage, "Don't touch the sets, the paint is still wet."

Each year some of these 'problems' become quite humorous only after the final curtain. Missed entrances, dropped lines, part of the cast who miss the early ferry and arrive just in time for the curtain are only a few of the uncertainties that we face. For instance, during the run of *The Green Pastures*, dark make-up and hair dye,

which are difficult to remove, were required. One of the 'angels,' who had a graduation baccalaureate service the evening of a performance, was racing to catch the ferry and did not have time to remove her make-up. Arriving on board the ferry for Seattle, mother, sister and 'angel' raced to the ladies room, where they began to remove the make-up. Many of the passengers were shocked that evening, when they found our 'angel' draped between two wash basins, costume on the floor, and her two 'attendants' frantically scrubbing at the stubborn make-up.

The weather is a constant concern, for sunny warm days bring larger crowds than rainy ones. During the run of *The Music Man*, it not only rained each day of the play, but poured opening weekend, thereby creating the first aquatic performance in The Forest Theatre. As if the rain were not enough, Mt. St. Helens also picked the opening weekend to erupt again, and unfounded reports of ash fall-out in the Kitsap County area were spread throughout the state, reducing the size of our audience to just a few. Many veteran actors could not remember weather worse than this, but actors and audience alike braved the weather, and the show went on.

You will note from the repetition of surnames in the program that many of the Players participate as a family, either on stage or helping with the many tasks that must be done in preparation of the play. Some of the cast are second generation Players whose parents met in this group, and there is one in our midst who appeared on stage at the age of three months (not as an actor, but as a prop), and he is still active with the Players.

Many of our audience are loyal fans who return each year; some even plan their vacations so as not to miss the play. During Sunday and Monday of Memorial Day Weekend, and the next two Saturdays and Sundays, when the rhododendrons are in full bloom, the Players fill the Forest Theatre with music and laughter as they present their annual spring play. We hope that you enjoy your day at the Forest Theatre and plan to join us again next year on May 30, 31, June 5, 6, 12 or 13 when again, the Forest Theatre comes to life.



Despite the extensive time and energy he devotes to theatrical activities, the bulk of his time is engaged as a serious musician and teacher with studios in Seattle and Bellingham. ROYCE NATOLI, Players Committee Chairman, has been active with The Mountaineer Players since 1967, marking his fifteenth consecutive performance in The Forest Theatre. Born in Seattle, Mr. Natoli attended West Seattle High School and Seattle University. In addition to drama, he has a wide range of interests within The Mountaineer Club which include backpacking, skiing and folkdancing. He has served on several committees, including Indoor Division Chairman.

The Players Committee are Mountaineer members with an interest in drama, volunteering their time to produce a play each spring at The Forest Theatre. During the fall and winter they present plays in our clubrooms and ski lodges. The Mountaineers' 215-acre rhododendron and forest preserve, in which The Forest Theatre is located, is being kept in its natural state for future generations to enjoy.




