

The Players and The Forest Theatre

A small group of Mountaineers were exploring an area around Wildcat Lake, just outside of Bremerton, in the early part of this century. They came upon an area called Hidden Valley, a picturesque valley of quiet glades, wild rhododendrons, Douglas Fir, cedar and dogwood trees. Skits were presented around the campfire that evening. The following year the group invited other Mountaineers to enjoy a production of *Robin Of Sherwood* under the blooming rhododendrons. They returned to the site every year to present a different show for the growing audiences. A theatre was constructed out of a natural cirque to accommodate the larger crowds that gathered. A performance of *Reinald and the Red Wolf* in 1926 christened what we now know as The Forest Theatre. The unique productions continued every year until 1943, when World War II required every American to join in the war effort. Presentation of the annual play resumed in 1947 and continues to this day.

The production of each show is a massive undertaking. Personal reward and the fellowship of friends and family compensate volunteers as they spend hundreds of hours preparing everything from costumes to clearing the stage of rocks. The uncertainty of weather conditions and our policy that the show goes on rain or shine present a number of unusual challenges for actors and production staff. The 1980 production of *The Music Man* presented the very real possibility of being "ashed on" by Mt. St. Helens, and 1994's production of *Little Mary Sunshine* took place in one of the wettest summers in recent memory. One member, whose parents met in the group, appeared on stage at the ripe old age of three months as a "prop". He (much later) married another member whose parents also became acquainted through the Players. They have introduced yet a third generation to our ranks. The group now contains active members who have been involved since the 1950's. We consider each other to be an extended family and have developed relationships that will last a lifetime.

The Rhododendron Preserve and the Mountaineer Foundation

The Forest Theatre is located in an area of old-growth forest which The Mountaineers have named the Rhododendron Preserve because of the profusion of our state flower there. It is now in two complementary ownerships, with the Mountaineers retaining 20 acres, which include the theatre and the buildings. The Mountaineer Foundation owns the remainder. The State Of Washington has granted conservancy status to the Foundation's portion as one of the few remaining lowland old-growth forest areas in the state. It is included in the Washington Register of Natural Areas.

Playgoers of long standing have been able to watch natural processes, such as a tree which blew down near the trail many years ago, and has started to decay and is now a nurse log for many young trees. These common features of old-growth forests are unique. The Foundation is dedicated to preserving the marvelous heritage contained in its property.

However, as the population of the area continues to grow, civilization encroaches ever closer to the borders of the Preserve. The Foundation has embarked on a campaign to purchase buffer property around the perimeter. It is able to accept donations which are tax-deductible to the giver. These purchases, while not of old-growth timber land, act as a buffer to protect the Preserve, and will be old-growth again. Several parcels have been purchased or donated to so far bring the total acreage of the Foundation's holdings so far to over 220 acres.
