As a little creative, metaphorical exercise, think about the Beast's plight. The Beast is actually a Prince who has been spellbound because he has not been able to show love for someone less fortunate as him. His inability to show love is his own misfortune. I think that we all have a beast inside of us that only love can keep tamed. Even Belle starts the story a little snooty about the "poor provincial town" she has been relegated to live in. But the Beast and Belle find the transforming magical power of love to set them free. Perhaps we can learn a little lesson from this as we seek to live with our inner beasts. The power of love is magical and transformative.

Just one more note: the rose is slowly dropping its petals throughout the show. This is witnessed at each stage by the enchantress who is the one who created the spell. See if you can track her on stage as she lurks in every corner, hoping the beast will come to find love. The petals are the minutes of the beast's life, the minutes of our life.



SALMON SAFARI

Join Kitsap Forest Adventure Camp's Julie Shusterman (a Salmon Docent) for a fun and informational adventure in the forest and at Chico Creek. Every year during November, seagoing salmon migrate from their feeding grounds to the rivers and streams of their birth. Chico Creek is the largest chum salmon run in Kitsap County. BIG TREE TRAIL

One of the delights of the Mountaineers' Kitsap Forest Theater is being surrounded by the Keta Legacy Foundation Rhododendron Preserve – a 460 acre nature conservancy with over 70 acres of old-growth forest. Ancient western red cedars abound with many other trees, ferns and wildlife. One of the biggest trees on the Kitsap Peninsula is located on the preserve. The trail to 'Big Tree' is about 1/2 mile long and starts near the historic Kitsap Cabin, ending at one of the 10 largest Douglas Fir trees in the world (2nd largest in Kitsap County). The tree itself is over 30' in diameter. The hike takes you on a bridge over Wildcat Creek with views of Hidden Valley, blooming trillium, wild rhododendrons and many other native trees and plants. You truly feel as if you have entered another world.

If you hike the trail after the show, please be sure your car is not blocking anyone in. Please note that the first part of the trail is steep – wear walking shoes and enjoy your trek into another time and place!

THE MOUNTAINEERS PLAYERS HISTORY

The rich history of The Mountaineers Players and the Kitsap Forest Theater began on a Spring day in 1909. A ‘local walk’ to view the wild blooming rhododendrons around Wildcat Lake began one of The Mountaineers most enduring traditions. The ‘misguided’ group of 66 Mountaineers wandered into Hidden Valley Ranch and met Edward Paschall and his family. A fast friendship was forged on that day.

A prominent activity among early Mountaineers visitors involved dramatic diversions. The skits and performances grew into a production of *Robin of Sherwood* on June 17, 1923. The performance marked the birth of The Mountaineers Players who went on to produce an annual spring show on the property every year to the present day – the only exception being four years during World War II and 2020. A summer show was added in 2007. Our 100th year anniversary is next year in 2023.

The Mountaineers Players are one of the oldest, continuously operating community theater groups in the country, performing in one of the oldest outdoor theaters in North America.
